The program proved to be one of the most interesting and informative technical presentation we have ever had. Mr. Jim Rohrer, Technical Industrial Specialist from Memphis, Tennessee and Mr. Jerry Mobley, sales representative from Huntsville presented a program on oil and lubricants and brought us up to date on the Ratest advancements in this industry. They discussed the latest advancements in this industry. They discussed the latest specifications of the Society of Automotive Engineers and the American Petroleum Institute and their relationship to the letter designations on oils. According to Mr. Rohrer an oil with an SE designation will meet or exceed any oil requirement for any car. The viscosity index should be selected according to the temperature extremes. An oil with a "W" suffix has been tested and indexed at OOF for winter applications and oils without a "W" suffix have tested and indexed at 210°F. Mr. Rohrer concluded this indicates a multigrade oil will have better lubricating qualities through all operating temperature extremes. All of my tender 21 years I've believed the "W" after the number on a can of oil stood for "weight" only to find out it stood for "winter".

THE TOM TOTCKY AWARD TROPHY

Over the past 6 years the North Alabama Region has awarded one of its members with the Tom Totcky Award for the best restored car of each year. Since our club has added a number of members during the years that the award has been given, we felt it was appropriate to give the background of the award to those of you who never knew Tom.

Tom was a typical antique car enthusiast. A transplanted yankee who had a slow Michigan accent and a basic knowledge of cars and mechanics acquired during the 50's. During those years he, like so many others, recognized a 25 year old car first as a good candidate for a customized hot rod and second as an antique car.

But that changed and by the time our club was formed in 1962 Tom had developed a genuine interest in restoring antiques and had developed all the typical characteristics of the hobby. He enjoyed chasing down oar leads and parts as much as any of us but, more than that, he exemplified the main purpose of the club. That is the sharing of knowledge, talent, and equipment among his friends in the hobby. He was always available to lend a hand, his gas welding outfit, or some other specialized tool that he had accumulated while becoming an emperienced auto mechanic.

I recall his willingness to be of help from a number of personal experiences. My first contact with Tom was when he helped get a rumble seat lid for my 1931 Model A Coupe then under restoration. The lid came from Tom's 1931 customized cabriolet which he had recently sold in a final break with his hot rod interests. There were other occasions during the restoration of my coupe when he was to help out. The seasoned oak he gave me to make body mounting blocks. The introduction to one of his metal working friends when a floor pan had to be reproduced. The list goes on with me and many others active in the club during those days.

Tragedy struck Tom on September 4, 1965 when he lost his life in an attempt to save the lives of three others in a boating accident. Even in his death he was, as always, helping someone else.

Our club wanted to do something in remembrance of Tom and completion of his 1928-29 Model A mail truck restoration seemed appropriate. This project, in a sense, embodied the helping hand quality that we all admired in Tom. Each member contributed some part or effort until the mail truck was presented to Jackie, Tom's wife in the summer of 1968.

The trophy for the best restored car was anonymously donated for presentation in Tom's name each year and as fate would have it the little 1931 Model A coupe he helped me on was the first car to receive the award in 1966. This trophy serves as a reminder of the true spirit of comradeship that our club should represent and hopefully it gives an incentive for every member to put out a restoration worthy of receiving the award. HEART OF HUNTSVILLE MALL 1973

Another successful Heart of Huntsville Mall Show is history. Tem Holley was show chairman and he is to be congratulated for his organization and planning of one of the most unique and interesting displays we have ever had. The Sears end of the mall was set up to show the various steps involved in antique car restoration. A before restoration car was furnished by Jerry Peoples, his 1923 Ford Coupe and Leonard Brown's 1924 Ford touring was the restored or finished product. Around these two vehicles were displays depicting 6 stages of restoration; disassembly, cleaning, woodworking, metal working, painting, and assembly. Anyone who took the time to study the displays will never again repeat that classic statement, "Boy, somebody sure took good care of that ene". Tom Holley, Dan Shady, Leonard Brown, Harlen Pratt, Kem Robertson, Ernie Cross, Ray Gause, Jerry Peoples and Sears furnished parts and equipment for the restoration display. Jim and Bobbie Charlton set up their restored gas pump and oil pump along with other pieces of service station equipment of a bygone era. Over half of the 33 cars on display were first timers at one of our mall shows.

Tom Holley and the North Alabama Region wishes to convey their thanks to everyone who participated, and especially to those who pulled guard duty. The only case of reported vandalism was the removal of the mustache and other indignities suffered by Bill Penney's manequin. Photographic coverage of the show was furnished by Gene George.






JIM FULTZ'S RARE 1933 PONTIAC CONVERTIBLE COUPE








